

Friends' efforts pay off

GARDENERS' green-fingered efforts have been rewarded with no fewer than six Green Flag awards for Trafford's parks and green spaces.

All places entered into the scheme have been successful - including Walkden Gardens, Worthington Park, Trafford Ecology Park, Hullard Park, Victoria Park and Denzell House Gardens.

The award is given to Britain's best parks and beauty spots.

Entrants are judged against stringent criteria - and must be welcoming and well maintained. They should also involve the community in their upkeep.

Walkden Gardens' special features include a Japanese garden, a dovecote and a new dry stone wall seating sculpture by professional dry stone waller Andy London.

Garth Jones, chair of the Friends of Walkden Gardens, said: "We are delighted to be able to fly the Green Flag again for Walkden. It's fantastic for all the hard work of the group to be recognised by this special award."

The Friends of Worthington Park recently commissioned chainsaw sculpture for Tim Burgess for their latest addition to the park - a giant sculpture of a wizard carved out of the stump of a tree.

They have been developing their busy events programme with a series of car boot sales and fun days organised over the summer months, and are also developing a school education pack to draw attention to all the different trees in the park.

Friends' group member Ruth Fletcher said: "We're delighted to get the Green Flag again. It's fantastic to see the park improving year on year, and really gives us the drive to keep up the hard work on all our projects."

Kids' centres hold fun days
PLENTY of fun is in store for youngsters with the launch of two children's centres. The new units in Broadheath and Davyhulme will officially open later this month - and to mark the occasion family open days will be held.

There'll be plenty of entertainment for little ones at both events, while their parents and guardians can find out more about the services provided by the centres which will be run by council health and social care experts.

The first fun day will be held at the Broadheath and Dunham Children's centre, based at Broadheath Primary School, Sinderland Road, on Saturday, July 26, from 11am.

The fun moves to the Davyhulme and Urnston children's centre at Davyhulme Library, Hayeswater Road, Urnston, the following Wednesday, July 30 starting at 10am.

Councillor John Holden, who will be cutting the ribbon at both venues, described these new centres as a "significant" step in the development of children and young people's service.

By 2010, Trafford will have 16 of these centres.

"With the opening of each local children's centre, we are creating improved, localised services for families with young children," he said.
